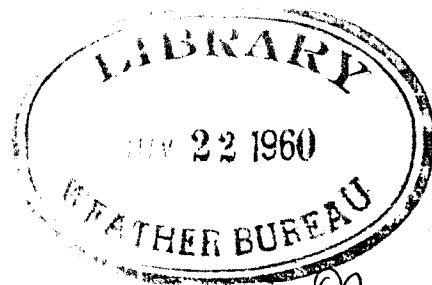

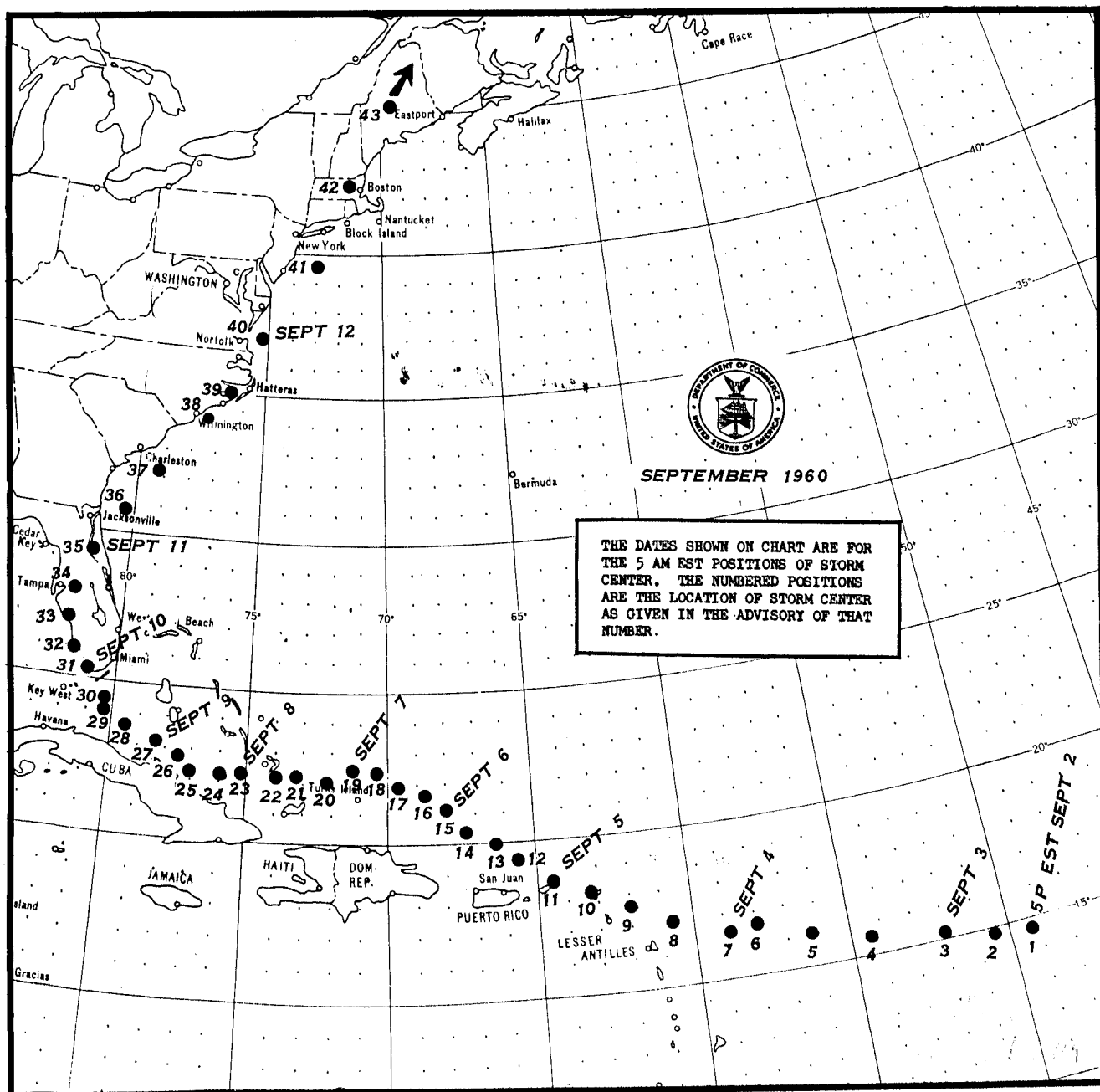

TROPICAL STORM "DONNA" SEPTEMBER 2-13, 1960
PRELIMINARY REPORT*

Unprecedented damage, estimated to be over \$1 billion, was wrought by hurricane Donna as she moved along a great sweeping 6,000-mile path through the Lesser Antilles and the Bahamas, across Florida, along the Atlantic coast and over the Northeastern States from Long Island to Maine. The loss of life attributed to Donna was unusually low considering the marked intensity of the storm and destruction of property in the extensive populated regions affected. Preliminary reports indicate 31 lives lost in the United States, 98 in Puerto Rico, and 23 in the Leeward Islands.

The first advisory on this hurricane, at 5 p.m., e.s.t., September 2, placed the center about 700 miles east of the Lesser Antilles, with a central pressure of 28.73 inches and maximum winds estimated at 135 m.p.h. A subsequent westnorthwestward course took the storm center north of Puerto Rico where there were many casualties and extensive damage from floodwaters. Puerto Rico missed the full force of the hurricane which was accompanied by winds estimated at 140 m.p.h., at the time the center passed. The track passed north of Cuba and at about 1 a.m., e.s.t., on September 10 the leading edge of the hurricane "eye" moved onto the central Florida Keys. At 2 a.m., e.s.t., Sombrero Light reported a gust of 150 m.p.h. Communications in the Keys began to fail and in a short time contact had been broken over a 35-mile strip from Marathon to Tavernier. Estimates now indicate that 75 percent of the buildings throughout this section were destroyed or severely damaged. The last report from Tavernier estimated a wind of 135 m.p.h. Gusts of 97 m.p.h., were reported at the Miami Airport Tower (FAA) and gusts of 80 m.p.h., at the Miami Weather Bureau Office.

After emerging into the Gulf of Mexico the center moved north-northwestward along the Florida west coast, over Cape Sable, and passed inland at Ft. Myers about 2:30 p.m., e.s.t., on the 10th. At Ft. Myers a lull, indicating passage of the eye, was observed from 2:20 p.m., to 3:31 p.m. The station reported a low barometer reading of 28.08 inches, maximum winds of 92 m.p.h., from the northeast and a peak gust of 121 m.p.h., at 1:31 p.m. High tides in the area were estimated to be 4 to 7 feet above normal. At last contact a ham radio operator in Everglades City reported winds 90 to 120 m.p.h., at 7 a.m., and from Naples there was a report indicating maximum winds of 75 m.p.h., and gusts to 80 m.p.h.

Damage at Ft. Myers, Everglades City, and Naples was extremely high. At Ft. Myers, in a densely populated area, damage ran into many millions of dollars. In Everglades City, a town which had been fully evacuated before the hurricane struck, about 50 percent of the buildings were destroyed. Taking a northeastward course across Florida, the storm passed through the main citrus-growing areas in the central section of the State and caused extensive damage. Estimates indicate 50 percent of the grapefruit was blown from the trees.

After crossing the Florida east coast about midway between St. Augustine and Daytona Beach on the morning of the 11th, Donna moved out over the Atlantic, continuing a northeastward course off the south Atlantic coast. The center later passed inland again over the North Carolina coast between Wilmington and Morehead City. Tides of 6 to 8 feet above normal along the North Carolina and Virginia coasts - combined with high winds - caused severe damage at many points. Maximum winds in the area were of hurricane force, with Wilmington, N. C., reporting a peak gust of 97 m.p.h., and a low barometer reading of 28.41 inches at 9:50 p.m., of the 11th. Hatteras reported a maximum wind of 72 m.p.h., from the south, gusts of 94 m.p.h., and a low barometer reading of 28.76 inches at 3:10 a.m., of the 12th. At Norfolk wind gusts reached 75 m.p.h., from the northwest, the low barometer reading was 28.65 inches and serious flooding resulted when tides reached 7 feet above normal.

At 7 a.m., e.s.t., on the 12th, Donna was centered off-shore about 60 miles southeast of Ocean City, Md., and was moving northeastward at 35 to 40 m.p.h. Its western side was sweeping the coastal districts of Maryland and Delaware with hurricane force winds (over 74 m.p.h.), heavy rain, high seas, and a storm surge of about 4 to 6 feet. (Storm surge is the difference between the observed tide and the normal tide.) Strong winds were experienced as far as approximately 100 miles inland. Heavy rainfall reached further inland to the Appalachians. Farther north, gusts of gale strength were reaching Long Island and the heavy rain had spread into southeastern New York and southern New England.

During the hours from 7 a.m., to 3 p.m., of the 12th, the center of the storm, elongated east-west to a width of about 100 miles, continued its rapid northeastward course. The western edge of the "eye" brushed the New Jersey shore, and about 1:30 to 2:30 p.m., apparently the entire center crossed over Long Island. Wind gusts of hurricane force were affecting coastal New Jersey, metropolitan New York City, Long Island, eastern Connecticut, and Rhode Island. Strong winds, along with heavy rains, were experienced in the zone bounded by a rough semicircle from New Jersey through the eastern half of Pennsylvania and southeastern New York into eastern Massachusetts.

Hurricane winds slammed at the Nation's largest metropolis, at its extensive suburbs, at the cities, towns, farms, and factories of the most densely populated and most heavily industrialized region of the United States. As along the Maryland-Delaware coast earlier, docks, boats, and beachfront buildings were being battered by heavy seas and by the storm surge. Local floodings were occurring in the above-designated zone, since in many areas Donna's downpour was falling on streams already high and ground saturated from previous rainfall. Trees, signs, TV antennas, and utility lines were going down. Air, marine, and land transportation was crippled. Schools were closed and ordinary business and agricultural activities were disrupted.

These conditions continued into southern and east-central New England as the hurricane's center went inland over Connecticut about 3 p.m., e.s.t., then passed through eastern Massachusetts into southeastern New Hampshire. Rhode Island was hard hit, but the hurricane's intensity decreased rapidly as it moved over land. In northeastern New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and western Maine rainfall was heavy, but winds were not severe, except near and a short distance east of the storm track. At 11 p.m., Donna was centered about 40 miles northwest of Bangor, Maine, and except in Maine, winds had subsided, rain had ceased, and skies had cleared over the Northeast.

Over the Northeastern States, Donna was notable for its severity, and was unusual by reason of the large size and complex character of its center. The peak wind gust recorded in the Northeast appears to have been 140 m.p.h., from the south-south-east at the Blue Hill Observatory, Milton, Mass., at 4:32 p.m., e.s.t. Other very high gusts were 130 m.p.h., at Block Island, R. I.; 82 m.p.h., at New York, N. Y.

Despite its severity, and its affecting heavily populated areas, fatalities and injuries from Donna were, comparatively speaking, very slight. This fortunate outcome is attributable to accurate and timely warnings, prompt and efficient action by government and public safety agencies, and the cooperation of the general public. On the other hand, property damage must be accounted high even though only imprecise estimates are possible at this writing. The same must be said of agricultural losses, which are even more difficult to assess.

*The preliminary data and a considerable amount of the narrative report was compiled by the Weather Bureau Office of Climatology.

Warnings and Forecasts

The track of the center of the storm as indicated by the advisory positions is shown on the cover of this report.

A total of 43 advisories were issued by the hurricane warning centers in San Juan, Miami, Washington and Boston as the storm moved into the different areas of responsibility. Each advisory was coordinated between adjacent offices and with the National Meteorological Center in Washington prior to release. The advisories were supplemented by special intermediate bulletins for the press radio and television and by local statements issued by all Weather Bureau offices along the path of the storm. A brief chronology of the warnings follows:

- Sept. 2, 1960--Located by Navy reconnaissance investigative flight.
First advisory on hurricane issued at 6 P.M., AST by Hurricane Warning Center at San Juan, P. R.
- Sept. 3 12:00 Noon, AST. Hurricane Watch announced for Leeward Islands
6 P.M., AST. Hurricane Warnings announced for Leeward Islands, Hurricane Watch ordered for Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands.
- Sept. 4 6 A.M., AST. Hurricane watch changed to hurricane warning for Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands. Advisory warned of hurricane winds, high tides, rough seas, and torrential rains.
- Sept. 5 6 A.M., AST. Hurricane warnings discontinued for northern Leeward Islands.
9 A.M., AST. Hurricane Warnings changed to gale warnings for the south and west coast of Puerto Rico and the northern Virgin Islands.
The storm was tracked by land based radar at WBAS, San Juan.
12 Noon, AST. Hurricane warnings for the remainder of the Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands changed to gale warnings.
6 P.M., AST. Gale warnings discontinued for Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.
Heavy rains early on Sept. 5 caused serious flooding in southern and eastern areas of Puerto Rico. Over 100 persons dead. Very extensive damage.
- Sept. 6 11 A.M., EST. Interests along the southeast Atlantic coast were advised to keep in touch with all future advisories during the next several days.
- Sept. 6-7 The hurricane was under constant watch by weather reconnaissance aircraft and land based radar along the Atlantic missile range.
- Sept. 7 5 A.M., EST. Interests on the Caicos Islands and Mayaquans Island in the Bahamas were advised to make immediate preparations for the possibility of winds of hurricane force. Other islands in the central Bahamas were urged to take preliminary precautions.
1:30 P.M., EST. A hurricane watch was issued for the Florida lower east coast from Melbourne to Key West.
- Sept. 8 11 A.M., EST. All interests along the north coast of Cuba from Cayo Romano westward were urged to take immediate precautions for hurricane force winds, heavy rains and abnormally high tides.
Hurricane warnings were issued for the Florida Keys from Key Largo to Key West including the Dry Tortugas. The hurricane watch was extended northward and included the area from Melbourne to Key Largo and the southwest Florida coast to Fort Myers.
5 P.M., EST. Gale warnings issued north of Key Largo to Vero Beach.
- Sept. 9 11 A.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended to include the south coast of Florida from Fort Lauderdale to Punta Gorda.
Gale warnings were extended from Punta Gorda to St. Marks including Lake Okeechobee.
1 P.M., EST. Hurricane watch extended on the Florida west coast to Cedar Keys and continued on the east coast from Ft. Lauderdale to Melbourne.
11 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended on the east Florida coast to Melbourne and the Gulf coast northward to Clearwater including Lake Okeechobee.
- Sept. 10 3 A.M., EST. Direct contact with reporting stations on the Keys was lost. Winds of 120 to 135 MPH were reported before communications went out.
5 A.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended on the Florida east coast to Daytona Beach and on the Gulf Coast to Cedar Key.
Gale north of Daytona Beach to Savannah.
5 P.M., EST. Gale warnings extended north of Savannah, Ga., to Myrtle Beach, N. C.
11 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended on the Florida east coast from Daytona Beach, Fla., to Savannah, Ga.
All warnings lowered on Florida Keys.

- Sept. 11 11 A.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended from Savannah, Ga., to Myrtle Beach, N. C., and gale warnings issued north of Myrtle Beach to Cape Hatteras, N. C. All warnings lowered south of Vero Beach on our Florida west coast.
- 5 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended to include entire North Carolina coast and gale warnings extended north to Cape May, N. J. Hurricane warnings lowered from Fernandina, Fla., to Beaufort, S. C.
- 8 P.M., EST. Special bulletin issued warning eastern North Carolina of increased threat due to acceleration and slight westward displacement of track of hurricane.
- 9 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended north of the upper North Carolina coast to Portsmouth, N. H. Gale warnings and a hurricane watch issued Portsmouth, N. H. to Eastport, Me.
- Sept. 12 5 A.M., EST. Hurricane warnings extended to Eastport, Me. All warnings south of Cape Hatteras lowered.
- 7 A.M., EST. Hurricane warnings lowered south of Cape Charles, Va.
- 2 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings lowered south of Cape May, N. J.
- 5 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings lowered south of Manasquan, N. J.
- 8 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings lowered south of Block Island, R. I.
- 11 P.M., EST. Hurricane warnings lowered Eastport, Me., to Block Island, R. I.

The complete texts of the advisories, bulletins and local statements issued by the Weather Bureau are included in this report.

Tracking

The tracking of the storm by Navy and Air Force weather reconnaissance aircraft, the missile tracking stations in the Caribbean and the Weather Bureau's own radar network enabled the forecasters to keep abreast of the storm's movement and intensity. The Air Force flew 6 missions in connection with the storm while the Navy made 21 flights. In addition, the Weather Bureau aircraft assigned to the National Hurricane Research Project flew 10 missions to collect valuable data. Radar meteorologists of the Weather Bureau detailed to Air Defense Command radar sites also contributed to the careful tracking of this storm.

THE HURRICANE IS MOVING VERY SLOWLY AT NOT MORE THAN 8 MPH TOWARDS THE WEST NORTHWEST AND THE NAVY RECONNAISSANCE PLANE WHICH PENETRATED THE EYE EARLY THIS MORNING FOUND THAT IT HAS MAINTAINED ITS INTENSITY DURING THE NIGHT. HIGHEST WINDS ARE STILL ESTIMATED AT 140 MPH AND WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE EXTEND OUTWARD 90 MILES IN THE NORTHEASTERN SEMICIRCLE AND ABOUT 50 MILES TO THE SOUTHWEST. GALE FORCE WINDS EXTEND OUTWARD 200 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST AND 90 MILES IN THE SOUTHWEST SEMICIRCLE.

DONNA IS FORECAST TO CONTINUE A SLOW MOVEMENT TOWARDS THE WEST NORTHWEST AND PEOPLE IN THE CENTRAL BAHAMA ISLANDS HAVE BEEN WARNED TO TAKE ALL PRECAUTIONS AGAINST DANGEROUS WINDS AND HIGH TIDES AND ROUGH SEAS. SMALL CRAFT THROUGHOUT THE SOUTHEAST AND CENTRAL BAHAMAS HAVE BEEN CAUTIONED TO REMAIN IN PORT AND THOSE ALONG THE NORTH COAST OF HISPANIOLA HAVE BEEN ADVISED NOT TO VENTURE OUT UNTIL THE ROUGH SEAS THERE SUBSIDE.

IT IS TOO EARLY TO SAY WHETHER DONNA MAY AFFECT THE SOUTHEAST COAST OF THE UNITED STATES AND IT WILL LIKELY BE ANOTHER DAY OR TWO BEFORE THERE IS ANY CONCLUSIVE INDICATION. INTERESTS ALONG THE SOUTHEAST COAST WILL THEREFORE NEED TO KEEP IN TOUCH WITH ADVISORIES FOR THE NEXT FEW DAYS.

A HURRICANE WATCH IS IN EFFECT FOR THE FLORIDA LOWER EAST COAST FROM MELBOURNE TO KEY WEST. ALL INTERESTS IN THE BAHAMAS FROM THE VICINITY OF NASSAU SOUTHEASTWARD SHOULD CONTINUE ALL PRECAUTIONS FOR GALE TO HURRICANE FORCE WINDS VERY ROUGH SEAS AND HIGH TIDES THAT WILL RANGE FROM 4 TO POSSIBLY AS MUCH AS 12 FEET ABOVE NORMAL IN SOME PLACES. PRECAUTIONS SHOULD ALSO BE TAKEN IN EAST AND CENTRAL CUBA FOR WINDS OF GALE FORCE WITH RISK OF HURRICANE FORCE WINDS IN THE COASTAL AREA.

SEVERE HURRICANE DONNA IS CONTINUING ON A GENERAL WESTERLY COURSE AT ABOUT 10 MPH AND AT 8 AM WAS CENTERED NEAR RAGGED ISLAND IN THE BAHAMAS ABOUT 380 MILES SOUTHEAST OF MIAMI. NO CHANGE IN DIRECTION OR SPEED OF MOVEMENT IS EXPECTED IN THE NEXT 12 TO 18 HOURS. THIS COURSE CONTINUES TO PRESENT A THREAT TO THE FLORIDA EAST COAST AND THE KEYS FROM MELBOURNE TO KEY WEST AND ALL PERSONS IN THAT AREA SHOULD REMAIN ON THE ALERT FOR HURRICANE WARNINGS WHICH WILL LIKELY BE ISSUED FOR PART OF THE AREA LATER TODAY.

THE HURRICANE HAS CHANGED LITTLE IN SIZE OR INTENSITY AND STILL HAS WINDS ESTIMATED AT 150 MPH NEAR THE CENTER. WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE EXTEND OUTWARD 125 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST AND 80 MILES IN THE SOUTHWEST SEMICIRCLE. WINDS OF GALE FORCE EXTEND 250 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST AND 140 MILES TO THE SOUTHWEST.

SMALL CRAFT THROUGH THE BAHAMAS AND ALONG THE NORTH COAST OF CUBA SHOULD REMAIN IN SAFE HARBOR AND SMALL CRAFT ALONG THE ATLANTIC AND GULF COASTS OF SOUTH AND CENTRAL FLORIDA SHOULD NOT VENTURE FAR FROM PORT.

RAINS HAVE BEEN VERY HEAVY IN CONNECTION WITH DONNA AND ARE EXPECTED TO CONTINUE HEAVY. THESE RAINS WILL AFFECT EASTERN AND CENTRAL CUBA. TIDES WILL BE VERY HIGH ON THE NORTH COAST OF CENTRAL CUBA.

THE HURRICANE CONTINUES ON A WESTERLY COURSE AT NEAR 11 MPH AND IS EXPECTED TO MOVE BETWEEN WEST AND WESTNORTHWEST AT ABOUT THE SAME FORWARD SPEED DURING THE NEXT 12 TO 24 HOURS.

ALL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE RUSHED TO COMPLETION IN THE HURRICANE WARNING DISPLAY AREA AND PERSONS LIVING IN LOW LYING PLACES BELOW STANDARD HOUSING AND TRAILERS SHOULD SEEK SAFE REFUGE OR EVACUATE TO HIGHER GROUND. HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE IN EFFECT IN THE FLORIDA KEYS FROM KEY LARGO TO KEY WEST AND DRY TORTUGAS AND GALE WARNINGS NORTH OF KEY LARGO TO VERO BEACH. A HURRICANE WATCH CONTINUED IN EFFECT FROM MELBOURNE TO KEY LARGO AND OVER SOUTHWEST FLORIDA NORTHWARD TO FORT MYERS.

RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT AND LAND BASED RADAR SHOW THAT HURRICANE DONNA IS CONTINUING ON A COURSE TOWARDS THE WEST NORTHWEST AT ABOUT 10 MPH MOVING ALONG AND A SHORT DISTANCE OFF THE NORTH COAST OF CUBA. ALL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE RUSHED TO COMPLETION IN THE WARNING DISPLAY AREA AND PERSONS LIVING IN LOW LYING PLACES BELOW STANDARD HOUSING AND TRAILERS SHOULD SEEK SAFE REFUGE OR EVACUATE TO HIGHER GROUND. SOME LOW LYING ROADS WILL BE COVERED WITH WATER BECAUSE OF INCREASING TIDES. SEAS WILL BECOME VERY ROUGH WITH TIDES ABNORMALLY HIGH AS THE HURRICANE APPROACHES.

A FEW SQUALLS HAVE ALREADY REACHED THE SOUTHEAST FLORIDA COAST AND KEYS AND THESE WILL BE INCREASING IN FREQUENCY AND INTENSITY. SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE CONTINUED IN THE CENTRAL AND SOUTHWESTERN BAHAMAS FOR GALE FORCE WINDS WITH WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE CONTINUING IN THE VICINITY OF ANDROS ISLAND. MARKS INCLUDING LAKE OKEECHOBEE. A DANGEROUS HURRICANE NOW THREATENS MOST OF EXTREME SOUTH FLORIDA. THE EXTENSION OF HURRICANE WARNINGS THROUGH DADE COUNTY TO FORT LAUDERDALE IS BASED ON A SLIGHT INTENSIFICATION OF THE HURRICANE AND A VERY SLIGHT DISPLACEMENT NORTHWARD OF THE TRACK PREVIOUSLY FORECAST. SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE RUSHED WITH ALL POSSIBLE URGENCY IN THE AREA OF HURRICANE DISPLAY AND COMPLETED AT THE EARLIEST POSSIBLE MOMENT FROM FORT LAUDERDALE TO KEY WEST AND BY EVENING ON THE GULF COAST. IN THE HURRICANE AREA STORM TIDES WILL RANGE FROM AROUND 6 TO 7 FEET OVER MOST OF THE KEYS FROM KEY LARGO SOUTHWESTWARD WITH HEIGHTS RANGING UP TO AS MUCH AS 11 FEET IN A FEW PLACES MOST SUSCEPTIBLE TO STORM TIDES. IF THIS IS MAINTAINED IT MEANS THAT THE AREA OF MAXIMUM WINDS AND HIGHEST TIDES WOULD BE EXPERIENCED IN THE MIDDLE KEYS. THE CENTRAL PRESSURE CONTINUES STEADY AT ABOUT 27.85 INCHES.

STORM TIDES HAVE BEEN FORECAST UP TO 6 TO 7 FEET ABOVE NORMAL FROM KEY LARGO SOUTHWESTWARD AND AS HIGH AS 11 FEET IN A FEW PLACES MOST SUSCEPTIBLE TO STORM TIDES. TIDES IN THE CARD SOUND HOMESTEAD AREA SHOULD RANGE FROM 4 TO 6 FEET AND NORTH OF HOMESTEAD TO POMPANO BEACH FROM 2 TO 4 FEET ABOVE NORMAL. CONSIDERABLE FLOODING IS LIKELY ALONG THE NORTHERN AND WESTERN SHORELINES OF LAKE OKEECHOBEE IN SECTIONS NOT PROTECTED BY THE DIKES. HIGHWAY 78 ALONG THE NORTHWEST SIDE OF THE LAKE MAY BE UNDERWATER.

HEAVY RAINS EXCEEDING 8 INCHES WILL CAUSE LOCAL FLOODING OVER THE STATE TODAY AND TONIGHT.

THE PRESENT COURSE OF THE HURRICANE WOULD BRING THE CENTER NEAR THE TAMPA BAY AREA BY MIDNIGHT BUT REMEMBER THAT THE DANGEROUS WINDS OUTFRONT AND ARRIVE EARLIER THAN THE HURRICANE CENTER AND EXTEND FOR A WIDE DISTANCE FROM THE CENTER.

ALL SHIPPING NEAR THE FLORIDA EAST AND WEST COAST SHOULD EXERCISE CAUTION AND SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT AROUND FLORIDA AND NORTHWARD TO SAVANNAH ON THE ATLANTIC COAST AND NOT VENTURE FAR FROM PORT NORTHWARD TO CAPE HATTERAS.

ALL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY SHOULD BE CONTINUED IN THE AREAS WHERE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED.

AT 3 PM EST SEVERE HURRICANE DONNA WAS CENTERED ON THE SOUTHWEST FLORIDA COAST IN THE VICINITY OF FORT MYERS. AT 210 PM FORT MYERS REPORTED WINDS DIMINISHING AND BAROMETRIC PRESSURE LEVELING OFF AT 28.13 INCHES AFTER REACHING A WIND MAXIMUM OF 92 MPH WITH GUSTS TO 115 MPH. VELOCITIES NEAR OR IN EXCESS OF THIS ARE EXPECTED AFTER THE EYE MOVES PAST THE AREA.

TRACKING BY RADAR INDICATES DONNA CONTINUES ON A NORTHWEST TO NORTH NORTHWEST COURSE AT ABOUT 9 MPH.

HIGHEST WINDS NEAR THE HURRICANE CENTER ARE ESTIMATED AT 135 MPH. HURRICANE FORCE WINDS OF 75 MPH OR HIGHER EXTEND OUT 125 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST AND 80 MILES IN THE SOUTHWEST SEMICIRCLE. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED 125 MPH OVER A SMALL AREA NEAR THE CENTER. WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE EXTEND OUT 115 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST AND 80 MILES IN THE SOUTHWEST SEMICIRCLE. ALL PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE CONTINUED NEAR AND IN ADVANCE OF THE HURRICANE AS IT ADVANCES NORTHWARD THROUGH FLORIDA. HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE NOW DISPLAYED ON THE FLORIDA WEST COAST FROM CEDAR KEY SOUTHWARD THROUGH THE KEYS ALSO ON THE EAST COAST NORTH OF PALM BEACH TO DAYTONA BEACH AND ON LAKE OKEECHOBEE. GALE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED NORTH OF CEDAR KEY TO ST MARKS AND NORTH OF DAYTONA BEACH TO MYRTLE BEACH SOUTH CAROLINA.

WINDS NEAR THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA ARE ESTIMATED ABOUT 125 MPH. FORT MYERS REPORTED A MAXIMUM WIND OF 121 MPH WHEN THE CENTER PASSED THERE THIS AFTERNOON. HIGH WINDS ARE SPREADING NORTHWARD AND GUSTS OF 70 MPH HAVE BEEN REPORTED AT ST PETERSBURG AND AT WINTER HAVEN. AT 6:45 PM WINDS AT THE COAST GUARD STATION AT FORT PIERCE WERE STILL REPORTING GUSTS TO 68 MPH.

AT THE SAME TIME WINDS OF GALE TO HURRICANE FORCE WERE OCCURRING OVER A LARGE PART OF NORTH AND CENTRAL FLORIDA. VERO BEACH HAD GUSTS TO 61 MPH TAMPA GUSTS TO 55 AND VENICE GUSTS TO 90 MPH.

THE EYE SHOULD PASS VERY CLOSE TO LAKE LAND ABOUT 11 PM. THE PRESENT COURSE LESSENS SOMEWHAT THE DANGER OF EXTREMELY HIGH TIDES ALONG THE EAST AND WEST COAST BUT THERE IS STILL A POSSIBILITY OF TIDES RANGING UP TO 4 TO 7 FT ABOVE NORMAL. THESE ARE MORE LIKELY ON THE EAST COAST IN THE FORWARD PORTIONS OF THE HURRICANE WHILE WINDS ARE EASTERLY AND ON THE WEST COAST AFTER THE WINDS BECOME WESTERLY.

DONNA IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE ON ABOUT THE SAME COURSE AND PASS NEAR BUT PROBABLY A LITTLE TO THE WEST OF JACKSONVILLE SUNDAY AFTERNOON. WINDS SPREADING NORTHWARD IN ADVANCE OF THE HURRICANE WILL RESULT IN GALES OF 40 TO 70 MPH AS MUCH AS 250 MILES TO THE NORTHEAST OF THE CENTER. SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT AROUND THE FLORIDA KEYS UNTIL THE WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE. SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT ALONG THE ATLANTIC COAST TO MYRTLE BEACH AND NOT VENTURE FAR FROM PORT NORTH OF MYRTLE BEACH TO CAPE HATTERAS. A LAKELAND RADIO STATION REPORTED A CALM WIND JUST PRIOR TO MIDNIGHT WHICH INDICATES THAT HURRICANE DONNA IS STILL WELL ORGANIZED. RADAR REPORTS FROM TAMPA MIAMI AND DAYTONA BEACH ALSO SHOW DEFINITE EYE STRUCTURE AS THE CENTER MOVES OVERLAND TOWARD THE GREATER JACKSONVILLE AREA. IT IS EMPHASIZED THAT ALL VIGILANCE SHOULD BE CONTINUED FOR DANGEROUS WINDS SEVERE RAIN SQUALLS HEAVY RAINS AND FOR ABNORMALLY HIGH TIDES IN THE COASTAL AREA. THE LOWEST PRESSURE AT LAKELAND WAS 28.60 INCHES.

A FEW REPORTS ABOUT THE STATE AROUND MIDNIGHT INCLUDE VERO BEACH WITH GUSTS TO 80 MPH AND FT PIERCE 78 MPH. BROOKSVILLE A SHORT DISTANCE NORTHWEST OF THE STORM HAD A NORTHERLY WIND WITH GUSTS TO 50 MPH WITH A BAROMETER READING OF 29.23 INCHES. HEAVY RAIN IS OCCURRING AT ORLANDO.

HURRICANE WARNINGS REMAIN DISPLAYED ON THE FLORIDA WEST COAST FROM CEDAR KEY SOUTHWARD AND ON THE ATLANTIC COAST FROM SAVANNAH TO PALM BEACH. GALE WARNINGS REMAIN DISPLAYED NORTH OF CEDAR KEY TO ST MARKS AND NORTH OF SAVANNAH TO MYRTLE BEACH.

HEAVY RAINS TOTALLING UP TO 8 TO 12 INCHES WILL OCCUR CAUSING CONSIDERABLE LOCAL FLOODING AS DONNA CONTINUES ON THE NORTHWARD COURSE OVER FLORIDA SPREADING INTO GEORGIA AND THE EASTERN CAROLINAS AS THE HURRICANE PROGRESSES.

AT 3 AM HURRICANE DONNA MOVING NORTH TO NORTHEAST AT ABOUT 12 MPH WAS CENTERED NEAR ORLANDO FLORIDA. THIS TRACK AND SPEED OF MOVEMENT WOULD BRING THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA SLIGHTLY EAST OF JACKSONVILLE BY MIDDAY TODAY. RADAR REPORTS CONTINUE TO SHOW A DEFINITE EYE STRUCTURE AS THE CENTER MOVES TOWARD THE NORTHEAST FLORIDA COAST. IT IS EMPHASIZED THAT ALL VIGILANCE SHOULD BE CONTINUED FOR DANGEROUS WINDS SEVERE RAIN SQUALLS HEAVY RAINS AND FOR ABNORMALLY HIGH TIDES IN THE COASTAL AREA.

ORLANDO FLORIDA IS REPORTING HEAVY RAIN AND HAS HAD SUSTAINED WINDS AROUND 40 MPH WITH GUSTS WELL INTO THE 60s. THERE HAS BEEN WIDESPREAD WINDOW DAMAGE IN THAT CITY AND SOME ROADS ARE NEXT TO IMPASSABLE THROUGHOUT ORANGE COUNTY.

HEAVY RAIN IS OCCURRING AT LAKE MARY AND PEOPLE IN THIS AREA HAVE BEEN EVACUATED TO SANFORD. THERE HAS BEEN A POWER FAILURE AT SANFORD. NEW SMYRNA BEACH HAS HAD NORTHEAST WINDS OF 95 MPH GUSTS TO 100 MPH RECEIVED BY RADIO HAM OPERATOR.

HURRICANE WARNINGS REMAIN DISPLAYED ON THE FLORIDA WEST COAST FROM CEDAR KEY SOUTHWARD AND ON THE ATLANTIC COAST FROM SAVANNAH TO PALM BEACH. GALE WARNINGS REMAIN DISPLAYED NORTH OF CEDAR KEY TO ST MARKS AND NORTH OF SAVANNAH TO MYRTLE BEACH.

ALL PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN IMMEDIATELY FOR THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY NORTH OF DAYTONA BEACH TO SAVANNAH. ALL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE CONTINUED ELSEWHERE IN THE AREA OF WARNING DISPLAY AND OVER THE INLAND AREAS NEAR AND ADVANCE OF THE HURRICANE.

HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED ABOUT 100 MPH MOSTLY IN SQUALLS OVER A SMALL AREA AROUND THE CENTER AND HURRICANE FORCE WINDS EXTEND OUTWARD ABOUT 75 MILES IN ALL QUADRANTS. EASTERLY WIND GUSTS TO 70 MPH WERE RECORDED AT ST AUGUSTINE BEFORE POWER FAILURE WHILE WIND GUSTS ESTIMATED TO NEAR 125 MILES PER HOUR OCCURRED AT NEW SMYRNA BEACH SOUTH OF THE STORM CENTER.

RECONNAISSANCE AIRCRAFT THIS FORENOON REPORTED A MINIMUM PRESSURE OF 968 MB OR 28.59 INCHES. THE MAXIMUM OBSERVED SUSTAINED SURFACE WINDS AT THE TIME WERE ABOUT 75 MPH WITH GUSTS TO ABOUT 100 MPH. PLANE PERSONNEL REMARKED THAT THE STORM APPEARED TO BE INTENSIFYING. HURRICANE WINDS EXTEND OUTWARD ABOUT 110 MILES IN THE SOUTHEAST SEMICIRCLE AND ABOUT 75 MILES IN THE NORTHWESTERN SEMICIRCLE. WITHIN THE PAST FEW HOURS SQUALLS UP TO 45 MPH HAVE BEEN REPORTED AT EXPOSED POINTS ALONG THE SOUTH CAROLINA BEACHES WITH TIDES 1 1/2 TO 2 FEET ABOVE NORMAL.

HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE NOW DISPLAYED FROM BEAUFORT SOUTH CAROLINA NORTHEASTWARD TO INCLUDE ALL OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST AND GALE WARNINGS NORTHWARD TO CAPE MAY NEW JERSEY. A HURRICANE WATCH CONTINUES ON THE VIRGINIA CAPES.

PRESENT INDICATIONS ARE THAT THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA WILL REMAIN OFF THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST AND THAT WINDS OF NO MORE THAN BARELY HURRICANE FORCE WILL OCCUR FROM CAPE ROMAIN WHICH IS A POINT OF LAND JUST OFF MCCLELLANSVILLE SOUTH CAROLINA NORTH EASTWARD. THE CENTER SHOULD PASS CLOSER TO THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST FROM CAPE FEAR NORTHEASTWARD AND IS EXPECTED TO BE NOT FAR FROM CAPE HATTERAS EARLY MONDAY MORNING. STORM TIDES 2 TO 3 FEET ABOVE NORMAL ARE EXPECTED DURING THE NEXT FEW HOURS ALONG THE SOUTH CAROLINA COAST FROM GEORGETOWN NORTHWARD WITH 3 TO 5 FEET ABOVE NORMAL TONIGHT ALONG THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST AND POSSIBLY SOMEWHAT HIGHER IN BAYS AND INLETS ALONG THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST MOST SUSCEPTIBLE TO THE HIGHEST TIDES ACCOMPANYING NORTH EASTERLY GALES. PERSONS ON THE NORTH CAROLINA COAST SUBJECT TO INUNDATIONS FROM TIDES OF THESE MAGNITUDES SHOULD EVACUATE AT ONCE.

AT 5 PM EST...2200Z...HURRICANE DONNA WAS ESTIMATED NEAR LATITUDE 32.2 NORTH LONGITUDE 79.2 WEST WHICH IS ABOUT 65 STATUTE MILES EAST SOUTHEAST OF CHARLESTON SOUTH CAROLINA NOW MOVING NORTHEASTWARD AT 23 MPH. DONNA IS EXPECTED TO MOVE NORTHEASTWARD WITH SOME SLIGHT ADDITIONAL INCREASE IN FORWARD SPEED DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS.

SEVERAL SMALL AND BRIEF TORNADIC STORMS HAVE OCCURRED IN THE CHARLESTON AREA THIS AFTERNOON WITH CONSIDERABLE PROPERTY DAMAGE AND ABOUT 10 PEOPLE HOSPITALIZED. HIGHEST WIND REPORTED IN THE CHARLESTON AREA HAS BEEN AROUND 70 MPH ON THE BEACHES. OAK ISLAND ON CAPE FEAR IN SOUTHEASTERN NORTH CAROLINA WAS REPORTING WINDS OF 40 TO 50 MPH WITH GUSTS TO 60 MPH LATE THIS AFTERNOON IN ADVANCE OF DONNA.

LATE REPORTS FROM THIS AREA SHOW WINDS 70 MPH AT CAPE HATTERAS LIFEBOAT STATION AND 85 MPH AT OCRACOCKE LIFEBOAT STATION. WINDS HAVE INCREASED AT ELIZABETH CITY WITH GUSTS TO 60 MPH.

PRESENT INDICATIONS ARE THAT DONNA WILL CONTINUE MOVING RAPIDLY IN A NORTHEASTERLY DIRECTION WITH A FORWARD SPEED OF 45 MPH. THIS WILL TAKE THE CENTER OVER THE NORFOLK AREA WITHIN THE NEXT FEW HOURS AND FUTURE MOVEMENT WILL CARRY THE HURRICANE ROUGHLY ALONG THE COASTLINE TOWARD EASTERN LONG ISLAND.

LATE REPORTS FROM EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA SHOW WINDS OF 77 MPH WITH STRONGER GUSTS AT CAPE HATTERAS AND ELIZABETH CITY REPORTED GUSTS TO 83 MPH. NEW BERN NORTH CAROLINA REPORTED THE EYE PASSED OVER THE CITY AT ABOUT 1 AM WITH RELATIVELY CALM WINDS FOR ABOUT ONE HALF HOUR.

ALL WARNINGS LOWERED SOUTH OF CAPE HATTERAS BUT SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE.

ALL EMERGENCY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE RUSHED TO COMPLETION IN THE COASTAL AREAS FROM VIRGINIA NORTHWARD THROUGH NEW ENGLAND FOR WINDS UP TO 100 MPH AND POSSIBLY SOME HIGHER GUSTS. AT 5 AM EST...1000Z...DONNA WAS CENTERED AT LATITUDE 37.0 NORTH AND LONGITUDE 75.2 WEST OR ABOUT 60 STATUTE MILES EAST OF NORFOLK VIRGINIA. HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE BEING LOWERED FROM EASTPORT MAINE TO BLOCK ISLAND RHODE ISLAND AT MIDNIGHT. SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE.

TIDES CONTINUE TO SUBSIDE ALONG THE COAST OF MAINE AND NEW HAMPSHIRE AND HAVE SUBSIDED THROUGH MASSACHUSETTS AND RHODE ISLAND. WINDS HAVE CONTINUED TO DIMINISH AND ARE ESTIMATED TO BE ABOUT 50 MPH NEAR THE CENTER. GALE FORCE WINDS STILL EXTEND 200 TO 300 MILES TO THE EAST OF THE CENTER AND SOME STATIONS IN THE CANADIAN MARITIMES HAVE REPORTED BRIEF GUSTS TO OVER 80 MPH DURING THE PAST THREE HOURS.

HURRICANE DONNA SO FAR HAS KEPT CLOSE TO THE TRACK PREDICTED SINCE YESTERDAY FORENOON. IF THE HURRICANE CONTINUES ON COURSE THE CENTER SHOULD BE CLOSE TO KEY WEST AROUND MIDNIGHT TONIGHT. THE CENTER SHOULD BE CLOSEST TO MIAMI BUT OVER 100 MILES TO THE SOUTHWEST BY LATE THIS AFTERNOON OR EARLY THIS EVENING.

ALONG THE LOWER EAST COAST AND KEYS WINDS WILL INCREASE IN EVERY PASSING SQUALL DURING THE DAY AND MAXIMUM WINDS TONIGHT AROUND KEY WEST AND ADJACENT KEYS SHOULD REACH 125 MPH WITH HIGHER GUSTS. MAXIMUM WINDS IN THE KEY LARGO AREA SHOULD REACH THE 75 TO 100 MPH RANGE AND HURRICANE GUSTS MAY BE EXPERIENCED AS FAR NORTH AS HOMESTEAD. A HURRICANE WATCH HAS BEEN EXTENDED NORTHWARD ALONG THE FLORIDA GULF COAST TO CEDAR KEY WHICH INCLUDES ALL OF THE TAMPA BAY AREA. HURRICANE WARNINGS HAVE BEEN ORDERED AS FAR NORTH AS PUNTA GORDA ABOUT 100 MILES SOUTH OF TAMPA BAY AND GALE WARNINGS ARE NOW DISPLAYED AS FAR NORTH AS ST. MARKS FLORIDA.

HURRICANE DONNA A VERY SEVERE HURRICANE AT 11 AM EST WAS CENTERED ABOUT 355 MILES SOUTHEAST OF TAMPA BAY AND MOVING TOWARD THE WESTNORTHWEST AT ABOUT 12 MPH. NO MATERIAL CHANGE IN SPEED DIRECTION NOR INTENSITY IS EXPECTED DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS.

THIS MORE NORTHWESTERLY MOVEMENT OF THE HURRICANE HAS INCREASED THE THREAT OF SEVERE WEATHER IN THE WEST CENTRAL FLORIDA COASTAL AREA BUT AT THIS TIME WE CAN NOT BE SURE OF ITS FUTURE COURSE AFTER TONIGHT. THERE IS NO CAUSE FOR ALARM IN THE TAMPA BAY AREA AT THIS TIME BUT ALL PRECAUTIONS ARE URGED SHOULD THE FUTURE MOVEMENT OF THE HURRICANE NECESSITATE EXTENSION OF HURRICANE WARNINGS NORTH OF PUNTA GORDA TO INCLUDE THE GREATER TAMPA BAY AREA.

SQUALLS HAVE ALREADY BEGUN TO REACH THE LOWER EAST COAST IN ADVANCE OF THE HURRICANE AND WHILE A FEW SHOWERS ARE EXPECTED IN THE TAMPA BAY AREA LATER TODAY AND TONIGHT SQUALLS WILL PROBABLY NOT BEGIN TO AFFECT THE TAMPA BAY AREA BEFORE EARLY SATURDAY. WHILE THE STORM IS SOUTH OF FT MYERS WINDS HERE WILL BE EAST OR NORTHEAST OR OFF SHORE TENDING TO KEEP THE TIDE OUT BUT ONCE THE STORM BECOMES ABEAM OF FT MYERS AND TO THE NORTH THE WINDS WILL BECOME SOUTH AND SOUTHWEST WHICH WILL BRING THE HIGH TIDES IN. THIS WILL COINCIDE WITH THE INCOMING HIGH TIDE TOMORROW AFTERNOON. IN VIEW OF THIS AND DUE TO A POSSIBILITY OF THE STORM SPEEDING UP AND ALSO TURNING MORE NORTHWARD THUS COMING IN CLOSER TO SHORE IT IS ADVISED THAT ALL PRECAUTIONS BE TAKEN AT ONCE AND EVACUATION OF THE BEACHES BE ACCOMPLISHED BY EARLY FORENOON. GALE FORCE WINDS WILL DEVELOP TONIGHT ALONG WITH HEAVY RAINS AND SQUALLS AND TOMORROW FORENOON WILL SEE WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE. EVERYONE SHOULD KEEP THEMSELVES INFORMED OF THE LATEST ADVISORIES AND BULLETINS IN THE EVENT LATER DEVELOPMENTS MAKE CHANGES NECESSARY.

ALTHOUGH HURRICANE DONNA IS MORE THAN 1000 MILES FROM NEW ENGLAND THE BOSTON WEATHER BUREAU HAS RECEIVED NUMEROUS INQUIRIES ABOUT THE POSSIBLE EFFECTS OF THE STORM ON THIS SECTION OF THE COUNTRY. AN INCREASE IN INQUIRIES APPEARS TO BE PARTIALLY DUE TO THE LATEST ADVISORY FROM THE MIAMI WEATHER BUREAU WHICH HAS EXTENDED THE HURRICANE WARNINGS NORTHWARD ON THE EAST FLORIDA COAST TO FORT LAUDERDALE AND ON THE FLORIDA GULF COAST TO PUNTA GORDA. THE EXTENSION OF THE HURRICANE WARNINGS TO INCLUDE DADE COUNTY AND MIAMI IS BASED UPON A SLIGHT INTENSIFICATION OF THE HURRICANE AND A VERY SLIGHT NORTHWARD DISPLACEMENT OF THE TRACK PREVIOUSLY FORECAST. AT NOON EDT THE CENTER OF THE HURRICANE WAS LOCATED ABOUT 154 MILES SOUTHSOUTHEAST OF MIAMI AND WAS MOVING WESTNORTHWEST AT ABOUT 12 MILES PER HOUR. NO MATERIAL CHANGE IN INTENSITY SPEED OR DIRECTION OF THE HURRICANE IS EXPECTED IN THE NEXT 12 HOURS.

IN VIEW OF THE GREAT DISTANCE OF THE HURRICANE FROM NEW ENGLAND THERE IS NO CAUSE FOR ALARM IN THIS SECTION OF THE COUNTRY FOR AT LEAST TWO DAYS. AT THIS TIME IT IS PREMATURE TO SAY WHEN IF EVER AND HOW IF AT ALL HURRICANE DONNA WILL AFFECT NEW ENGLAND. THE WEATHER BUREAU WILL CONTINUE TO FOLLOW THE STORM CLOSELY AND WILL ISSUE WARNINGS ADVISORIES BULLETINS AND STATEMENTS AS PROMPTLY AS POSSIBLE. IF THERE IS ANY POSSIBILITY THAT THE NEW ENGLAND AREA WILL BE AFFECTED DURING THE NEXT SEVERAL DAYS APPROPRIATE ADVICES WILL BE ISSUED SUFFICIENTLY IN ADVANCE FOR PRECAUTIONARY ACTION.

HURRICANE WARNINGS HAVE BEEN EXTENDED NORTHWARD ALONG THE WEST FLORIDA COAST AS FAR AS CLEARWATER AT 11 PM TONIGHT FRIDAY. ALL PRECAUTIONS THAT HAVE NOT ALREADY BEEN TAKEN TO PROTECT LIFE AND PROPERTY IN THE AREA OF HURRICANE WARNINGS SHOULD BE TAKEN AT ONCE.

DONNA WAS CENTERED ABOUT 300 MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF TAMPA BAY AT 11 PM AND IS CURRENTLY MOVING TOWARD THE NORTHWEST AT A RATHER SLOW SPEED OF 7 MILES AN HOUR. IT IS EXPECTED TO MOVE WITH LITTLE CHANGE IN SPEED DIRECTION AND INTENSITY DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS. A FURTHER TURN TOWARD A MORE NORTHERLY DIRECTION IS INDICATED BY TOMORROW AFTERNOON.

BECAUSE OF THE SLOW MOVEMENT OF THE HURRICANE AND THE INCREASING TENDENCY FOR IT TO ASSUME A MORE NORTHERLY COURSE EVACUATION OF LOW LYING BEACH AREAS FROM CLEARWATER BEACH SOUTH TO SARASOTA IS NOT CONSIDERED NECESSARY AT THIS TIME. HOWEVER AS THE FUTURE COURSE OF THE STORM BECOMES MORE CLEAR CUT EARLY SATURDAY RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO BEACH EVACUATION WILL BE ISSUED BY THIS OFFICE IF CONSIDERED NECESSARY. IT APPEARS POSSIBLE AT THIS TIME THAT THE CENTER OF THE HURRICANE MAY MOVE INLAND ALONG THE SOUTHWEST FLORIDA COAST. IF THIS DOES OCCUR HIGH TIDE EFFECTS FROM THE HURRICANE WOULD BE MUCH LESS THAN IF THE STORM CENTER MOVES NORTHWARD THRU THE EAST GULF OF MEXICO.

CLOSEST RAIN OR SQUALL AREA ON THE TAMPA RADAR IS ABOUT 60 MILES TO THE EAST AND SOUTHEAST. SQUALLS WILL BE MOVING INTO THIS AREA BY MORNING AND WINDS WILL GRADUALLY INCREASE FROM THE EAST OR NORTHEAST REACHING SPEEDS TO 50 MPH OR HIGHER BY SATURDAY AFTERNOON. HURRICANE FORCE WINDS OF 75 MPH OR GREATER ARE NOT EXPECTED IN THE GREATER TAMPA BAY AREA INCLUDING SARASOTA UNTIL LATE SATURDAY.

SQUALLS WITH WIND GUSTS TO 75 MPH HAVE MOVED UP THE FLORIDA EAST COAST AS FAR NORTH AS VERO BEACH. SQUALLS WILL MOVE INTO THE VOLUSIA AND FLAGLER COUNTY AREA BY MORNING AND WILL BECOME MORE NUMEROUS BY AFTERNOON. WINDS WILL SLOWLY INCREASE AND WILL REACH GALE FORCE IN SQUALLS BY LATE MORNING OR EARLY AFTERNOON.

HURRICANE EMERGENCY WARNINGS HAVE BEEN EXTENDED THIS MORNING AT 5 AM ALONG THE FLORIDA WEST COAST TO INCLUDE CEDAR KEY ABOUT 100 MILES NORTH OF TAMPA BAY. IT IS URGED THAT ALL NECESSARY SAFETY PRECAUTIONS THAT HAVE NOT ALREADY BEEN UNDERTAKEN IN THE AREA OF HURRICANE WARNING DISPLAY BE DONE SO AT ONCE. IMMEDIATE ACTION IS RECOMMENDED TO EVACUATE LOW LYING COASTAL AREAS SUBJECT TO HIGH TIDES BETWEEN 5 AND 7 FEET AND OTHER LOW AREAS SUBJECT TO FLOODING FROM VERY HEAVY RAINS ACCOMPANYING THE HURRICANE.

THE EYE OR CENTER OF SEVERE HURRICANE DONNA TOUCHED THE SOUTHWEST COAST OF FLORIDA NEAR CAPE SABLE AT 5 AM THIS MORNING AS SHE INCREASED HER FORWARD SPEED SLIGHTLY TO ABOUT 9 MPH. SHE IS NOW MOVING TOWARD THE NORTHWEST BUT IS EXPECTED TO MOVE TOWARD THE NORTH NORTHWEST AT THE SAME SPEED FOR THE NEXT 12 HOURS GRADUALLY RECURVING TOWARD A MORE NORTHERLY DIRECTION THEREAFTER. MOVEMENT MOSTLY OVER LAND FOR THE NEXT 24 HOURS SHOULD TEND TO WEAKEN THE HURRICANE SOMEWHAT BUT IT WILL STILL REMAIN A VERY DANGEROUS STORM AS THE WORST WEATHER ASSOCIATED WITH THIS TROPICAL GIANT MOVES INTO THE WEST CENTRAL FLORIDA AREA LATE TODAY AND EARLY SUNDAY MORNING.

THE FUTURE PROJECTED PATH OF THE HURRICANE APPEARS NOW THAT IT WILL MOVE NORTHWARD INTO CENTRAL FLORIDA BY LATE TONIGHT OR EARLY SUNDAY MORNING WITH THE CENTER OF THE STORM PASSING EAST OF THE GREATER TAMPA BAY AREA SOMETIME EARLY SUNDAY. THIS WILL HAVE THE EFFECT OF SPARING MUCH OF THE WEST CENTRAL COASTAL AREAS FROM EXTREMELY HIGH TIDES BUT TIDES NEVERTHELESS WILL RISE IN SOME AREAS TO AS MUCH AS 5 OR 7 FEET BY TONIGHT OR EARLY SUNDAY AS THE STORM CENTER MOVES NORTHWARD. NORTHEAST AND NORTH WINDS TODAY IN THIS AREA WILL GRADUALLY SHIFT INTO THE NORTHWEST AND WEST TONIGHT OR EARLY SUNDAY AS VELOCITIES APPROACH OR EXCEED HURRICANE FORCE OF 75 MPH.

BECAUSE OF THE SLOW MOVEMENT OF THE HURRICANE WINDS OF HURRICANE FORCE ARE NOT EXPECTED IN THE VOLUSIA FLAGLER COUNTY AREA UNTIL TONIGHT. THIS MEANS THERE IS MORE LIKELIHOOD OF SOUTHWEST WINDS BY LATE AFTERNOON AT THE SAME TIME OF THE INCOMING HIGH TIDE. NORMAL HIGH TIDE AT FT MYERS BEACH IS AROUND 4 THIS AFTERNOON. THIS MEANS A GOOD CHANCE OF A 5 TO 7 FOOT ABOVE NORMAL TIDE AND IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT EVACUATIONS BE COMPLETED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. SQUALLS IN THE AREA WILL BE INCREASING AS WILL THE RAIN AND HEAVY RAINS OF UP TO 8 INCHES WILL CAUSE FLOODING IN THE LOWLANDS ALONG THE STREAMS AND RIVERS OF LEE COUNTY. AT 7 AM THIS MORNING SEVERE HURRICANE DONNA WAS CENTERED ABOUT 15 MILES SOUTH OF EVERGLADES CITY NEAR THE SOUTHWEST COAST OF FLORIDA OR ABOUT 180 MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF TAMPA. SHE IS MOVING TOWARD THE NORTHWEST AT 9 MPH BUT HER DIRECTION SHOULD BECOME MORE NORTH NORTHWEST DURING THE NEXT 6 HOURS. SHE SHOULD GRADUALLY TURN MORE NORTHWARD LATER IN THE DAY WITH PRESENT INDICATIONS THAT THE CENTER OF THE STORM WILL PASS CLOSE TO OR JUST EAST OF TAMPA BAY EARLY SUNDAY MORNING.

ALTHOUGH IT IS QUITE POSSIBLE THAT DONNA WILL MOVE OVER QUITE A BIT OF LAND AREA BEFORE REACHING THE TAMPA BAY AREA WHICH MAY TEND TO DIMINISH HER INTENSITY SHE WILL STILL BE A VERY DANGEROUS STORM AND ALL NECESSARY PRECAUTIONS TO SAFEGUARD LIFE AND PROPERTY THAT HAVE NOT BEEN ALREADY UNDERTAKEN SHOULD BE TAKEN CARE OF AT ONCE. THIS MEANS THE WORST WEATHER STORM NAMELY HEAVIEST RAINS AND HIGHEST WINDS INCLUDING HIGH TIDES WILL OCCUR BETWEEN 8 PM TONIGHT AND 8 AM SUNDAY MORNING. AT THIS TIME WE CAN SEE NO REASON TO CHANGE OUR ORIGINAL FORECAST THAT THE CENTER OF THE HURRICANE WILL GRADUALLY RECURVE NORTHWARD WITH ITS CENTER MOVING ACROSS OR JUST EAST OF TAMPA BAY BETWEEN MIDNIGHT AND DAWN. BAROMETERS HERE AND SOUTH OF HERE ESPECIALLY CONTINUE AT THIS HOUR TO REFLECT RAPIDLY FALLING PRESSURES IN ADVANCE OF THE HURRICANES FORWARD MOVEMENT TOWARDS THE TAMPA BAY AREA. WINDS HAVE INCREASED SHARPLY IN THE FORT MYERS AREA AND AS FAR NORTH AS VENICE AND ENGLEWOOD IN THE PAST HOUR AT 10 AM FORT MYERS HAD NORTHEAST 45 GUSTS TO 60 BAROMETER 29.26 LIGHT RAIN - TAMPA NORTHNORTHEAST 22 GUSTS 29 BAROMETER 29.71 LIGHT RAIN - VERO BEACH EAST 35 GUSTS TO 49 BAROMETER 29.68 HEAVY RAIN - TARPON SPRINGS EAST NORTHEAST 20 BAROMETER 29.76 - TREASURE ISLAND NORTH NORTHEAST 25 GUSTS TO 40 BAROMETER 29.55 - EDMONT KEY NORTH NORTHEAST 38 BAROMETER 29.73 - SARASOTA NORTHEAST 18 GUSTS 28 BAROMETER 29.66 LIGHT RAIN - VENICE NORTHEAST 20 GUSTS TO 40 BAROMETER 29.57 - CEDAR KEY NORTHNORTHEAST 10 BAROMETER 29.76 AND BAYPORT NORTHEAST 10 BAROMETER 29.80 INCHES.

IT IS AGAIN URGED THAT ALL NECESSARY PRECAUTIONS FOR PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY BE TAKEN NOW IF NOT ALREADY TAKEN FOR THIS IS A VERY DANGEROUS HURRICANE. OVER FOUR INCHES OF RAIN HAS FALLEN AT MIAMI SINCE YESTERDAY AND THE RAINS ARE STILL HEAVY DOWN THERE. UP TO 8 INCHES OR POSSIBLY MORE OF RAIN IS LIKELY IN THIS AREA AS THE STORM MOVES THRU WEST CENTRAL FLORIDA TONIGHT AND EARLY SUNDAY. THIS WILL CAUSE FLOODING IN MANY LOW LYING AREAS AND SECTIONS OF COURSE ALONG THE HILLSBORO MANATEE ALAFIA AND OTHER SMALL STREAMS WILL NO DOUBT GO WELL OUT OF THEIR BANKS. LOW LYING COASTAL SECTIONS WILL BE FLOODED BY HIGH TIDES UP TO 7 FEET AND POSSIBLY HIGHER. THESE AREAS SHOULD BE EVACUATED.

WINDS IN SQUALLS EXTEND OUT FROM THIS CENTER SOME 250 MILES AND ARE EXPECTED TO REACH THE JACKSONVILLE AREA LATE THIS AFTERNOON. GALE WINDS ARE WINDS IN THE RANGE OF SPEEDS FROM 39 MPH TO 54 MPH.

THE UNSETTLED WEATHER EXPERIENCED HERE DURING THE LAST FEW DAYS WAS ASSOCIATED WITH CONDITIONS IN THE GULF OF MEXICO WHICH SOMETIMES BREED TROPICAL STORMS AT THIS TIME OF THE YEAR. RAPIDLY CHANGING CONDITIONS IN THE WEATHER CIRCULATION PATTERNS OVER THE UNITED STATES CMA WHICH DETERMINE THE COURSE FOLLOWED BY HURRICANES CMA MADE IT EXCEEDINGLY DIFFICULT TO FORECAST THE MOVEMENT OF DONNA FOR A PERIOD OF MORE THAN 24 HOURS IN ADVANCE. THE CIRCULATION PATTERN HAS NOW BECOME MORE FIXED SO THAT IT IS NOW POSSIBLE TO SAY THAT DONNA WITH ITS EFFECTS WILL REMAIN TO THE EAST OF THE NEW ORLEANS CMA MOBILE AND PENSACOLA AREAS. FURTHERMORE CMA THIS SAME CIRCULATION PATTERN WILL TEND TO DECREASE THE POSSIBILITY OF THE FORMATION OF ANOTHER TROPICAL STORM IN THE GULF OF MEXICO WHICH COULD AFFECT OUR AREA.

AT 210 PM THIS AFTERNOON ABOUT ONE HOUR AGO THE EYE OF HURRICANE DONNA WAS MOVING ACROSS THE FORT MYERS AREA. WINDS HAD DIMINISHED TEMPORARILY TO 25 MPH. HURRICANE DONNA IS MOVING NORTHWARD AT ABOUT 10 MILES PER HOUR FROM A 7 PM POSITION ABOUT 30 MILES EAST OF SARASOTA FLORIDA.

ALLOWING FOR SOME SPEED UP DURING THE NIGHT GALE WINDS ARE NOT EXPECTED BEFORE MID MORNING SUNDAY AND NOT OVER 45 TO 50 MILES PER HOUR BEFORE MID AFTERNOON.

THIS IS A SEVERE STORM AND WINDS ARE STILL REACHING 125 MILES PER HOUR IN GUSTS NEAR THE CENTER OR SLIGHTLY TO THE RIGHT OF THE EYE.

THIS WILL BE THE LAST LOCAL STATEMENT ON THIS STORM TONIGHT. THERE IS NO THREAT TO SOUTH CAROLINA BUT HEAVY RAINS ARE OCCURRING AND COASTAL RESIDENTS SHOULD BE ALERT SUNDAY MORNING TO WARNINGS ON BOTH HIGH TIDES AND LOCAL FLOODING AND INLAND RESIDENTS OF THE CAROLINAS ESPECIALLY IN THE HILL COUNTRY SHOULD BE ALERT FOR FLASH FLOODS IN CREEKS AND SMALL STREAMS FROM HEAVY LOCAL RAIN.

LOCAL STATEMENT TAMPA WEATHER BUREAU 815 PM EST SAT SEPT 10 1960

AT 8 PM THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA WAS VERY CLOSE TO WAUCHULA STILL CONTINUING TO MOVE IN A NORTHERLY DIRECTION AROUND 10 MPH. WAUCHULA REPORTED EASTERLY WINDS OF 80 TO 90 MPH WITH GUSTS TO 100 AND WITH THE WINDS TEARING UP EVERYTHING. THE HURRICANE IS STILL ON COURSE AND SHOULD BE ABEAM OF TAMPA CENTERED BETWEEN PLANT CITY AND LAKE LAND AROUND 11 PM OR MIDNIGHT. WINDS IN THE TAMPA AREA ESPECIALLY WILL CONTINUE TO INCREASE BETWEEN NOW AND MIDNITE WITH LITTLE LET UP EXPECTED BEFORE 3 OR 4 AM IN THE MORNING. DURING THE PAST FEW MINUTES GUSTS OF 65 MPH HAVE BEEN REPORTED - THE STRONGEST THUS FAR TODAY HERE AT THE AIRPORT. ALTHOUGH DANGER OF VERY HIGH TIDES HAS DIMINISHED IN THIS AREA DUE TO THE OFF SHORE WINDS THESE WINDS WILL BE CHANGING DIRECTION INTO THE NORTHWEST AND WEST LATER TONIGHT AS DONNA MOVES NORTHWARD AND THUS LOW LYING BEACH AREAS CAN EXPECT RATHER HIGH TIDES AS WINDS BEGIN TO BLOW ON SHORE LATER ON TONIGHT. IN THE SARASOTA AREA THE WINDS HAVE ALREADY SHIFTED NOW THAT THE HURRICANE CENTER HAS MOVED NORTHEAST OF THAT CITY. AS FAR SOUTH AS VENICE WINDGUSTS HAVE BEEN AS HIGH AS 95 MPH DURING THE PAST HOUR WHILE NOT TO FAR AWAY AT CLEARWATER ODDLY ENOUGH WINDS HAVE BEEN RELATIVELY LIGHT THUS FAR WITH PEAK WINDS APPARENTLY NOT MUCH OVER 35 OR 40 MPH. A CONTINUATION OF THIS MOVEMENT SHOULD BRING GALE FORCE WINDS TO THE SAVANNAH AREA LATE TONIGHT AND WHOLE GALE FORCE BY NOON SUNDAY. THESE WINDS WILL BE IN CONNECTION WITH OCCASIONAL RAIN SQUALLS WITH THESE SQUALLS CONTINUING THROUGH EARLY SUNDAY NIGHT.

WINDS HAVE NOW RISEN TO 69 MPH IN GUSTS FROM THE NORTH HERE AT THE AIRPORT WITHIN THE PAST FEW MINUTES AS THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA NOW CENTERED JUST WEST OF WAUCHULA AND ABOUT 42 MILES SOUTHEAST OF TAMPA CONTINUED TO MOVE NORTHWARD AT 10 MPH. AT VENICE WHERE WINDS SHIFTED TO THE NORTH NORTHWEST A FEW HOURS AGO SUSTAINED WINDS UP TO 80 MPH WITH GUST TO 95 TO 98 ARE BUILDING EXTREMELY HIGH SEAS ALONG THE COAST EXTENDING NORTHWARD PAST SARASOTA. WAVES AND ABNORMALLY HIGH TIDES UP TO 7 FEET OR HIGHER WITH 11 FEET IN SOME RESTRICTED INLETS WILL BRING WATER OVER MOST OF THE GULF BEACHES AS FAR NORTH AS THE HOLIDAY ISLES AND POSSIBLY CLEARWATER BEACH LATER TONIGHT AS THE WINDS SHIFT FROM NORTH INTO NORTHWEST AS THE SEVERE HURRICANE CONTINUES TO MOVE NORTHWARD. SEVERAL FEET OF WATER SHOULD COVER MUCH OF THESE ISLANDS FROM THESE EXTREMELY HIGH WAVES THAT WINDS UP TO 80 AND NEARLY 100 MPH ARE PRODUCING. IN THE IMMEDIATE TAMPA AREA WINDS WILL SHIFT INTO THE NORTHWEST AFTER MIDNITE AND TIDES UP TO 7 OR EVEN HIGHER IN TAMPA BAY CAUSING SOME FLOODING OF HILLSBORO AND OLD TAMPA BAY AREAS. EXTENSIVE DAMAGE HAS BEEN REPORTED IN WAUCHULA. THIS WAS JUST RECEIVED BY HAM RADIO OPERATOR. SHERIFFS OFFICE IN MONROE COUNTY REPORTS HURRICANE DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT BETWEEN 600 AND 700 MILLION DOLLARS. NO DOUBT TOTAL DAMAGE FOR THE STATE BEFORE DONNA LEAVES FLORIDA FOR GOOD SOME TIME LATE TOMORROW WILL BE IN EXCESS OF TWO BILLION DOLLARS BASED ON THE PRELIMINARY REPORTS FROM ONE AREA AT THE PRESENT TIME NAMELY THE FLORIDA KEYS.....

LOCAL STATEMENT MACON WEATHER BUREAU ON HURRICANE DONNA AS RELEASED TO CENTRAL GEORGIA NEWS AGENCIES 1015 PM EST SATURDAY SEPTEMBER 10 1960.

AT 9 PM HURRICANE DONNA WAS CENTERED 30 MILES SOUTHEAST OF TAMPA FLORIDA AND MOVING NORTHWARD AT 10 MILES PER HOUR. AT THE PRESENT TIME THERE IS NO INDICATION OF CHANGE OF COURSE OR SPEED OF THE STORM. THE EYE IS EXPECTED TO PASS JUST WEST OF JACKSONVILLE FLORIDA SUNDAY AFTERNOON. THIS WILL PLACE THE STORM CENTER ABOUT 150 MILES SOUTHEAST OF MACON. WINDS IN THE CENTRAL GEORGIA AREA WILL INCREASE GRADUALLY AS THE STORM MOVES NORTHWARD BUT ARE NOT EXPECTED TO EXCEED 50 MILES PER HOUR WITH POSSIBLE GUSTS TO 65 MPH. THIS IS NO WORSE THAN THE WINDS THAT ARE SOMETIMES ASSOCIATED WITH THUNDERSTORMS IN THIS AREA. PRECAUTIONS ARE URGED AGAINST LOOSE OBJECTS BEING CARRIED ABOUT BY THE WIND.

WINDS WILL BE CONSIDERABLY HIGHER IN SOUTH CENTRAL GEORGIA AND WILL PROBABLY EQUAL OR EXCEED HURRICANE SPEED OF 75 MILES PER HOUR IN THOSE COUNTIES NEAREST THE EYE OF THE STORM.

HEAVY RAINS ARE EXPECTED TO ACCOMPANY THE STORM NORTHWARD WITH THE HEAVIEST FALLS IN THE SOUTHERLY AREAS. FLOODING IS VERY LIKELY IN LOW LYING AREAS AND PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN FOR PROTECTION AGAINST HIGH WATER.

THE PRESENT POSITION OF HURRICANE DONNA IS ABOUT 80 MILES SE OF CHARLESTON SOUTH CAROLINA. IT IS MOVING NORTH-NORTHEASTWARD ABOUT 19 MPH WITH THE STRONGEST WINDS NOW 120 MPH IN A SMALL AREA NEAR THE CENTER.

WINDS IN THE HAMPTON ROADS AREA WILL GRADUALLY INCREASE THIS AFTERNOON AND TONIGHT AND REACH GALE FORCE...40 MPH OR HIGHER ...DURING THE NIGHT.

AT 6 AM THE LARGE POORLY DEFINED EYE OF DONNA WAS CENTERED IN THE ATLANTIC ABOUT 60 MILES EAST OF CAPE CHARLES VA. IT CONTINUES TO MOVE NWD PARALLEL TO THE EASTERN SHORE OF VA, AT A SPEED OF ABOUT 30 MPH. SINCE THIS HURRICANE IS NOW MOVING AWAY THE BAROMETRIC PRESSURE IN THE HAMPTON ROADS AREA IS RISING. THE LARGE ELONGATED EYE STILL COVERS SOME PORTIONS OF THE HAMPTON ROADS AREA. IF THE WINDS IN YOUR LOCATION ARE NOW ALMOST CALM YOU ARE PROBABLY IN THE EYE AND YOU SHOULD EXPECT THE WINDS TO SHIFT TO THE NORTHWEST AND INCREASE GREATLY WITHIN A FEW MINUTES.

WINDS IN THE HAMPTON ROADS AREA EARLY THIS MORNING WILL BE MOSTLY 30 TO 60 MPH FROM THE N TO NW AND SHOULD SLOWLY DIMINISH LATER THIS MORNING. AT 12 NOON TODAY THE CENTER OF THE HURRICANE WAS LOCATED AT 39.5 NORTH LATITUDE AND 73.0 WEST LONGITUDE OR ABOUT 80 MILES EAST OF ATLANTIC CITY NEW JERSEY MOVING NORTHEASTWARD AT ABOUT 45 MPH. LOCAL STATEMENT ON HURRICANE DONNA ISSUED BY WILMINGTON WEATHER BUREAU 4:30 PM EDT SEPTEMBER 12 1960.

HURRICANE WARNINGS WERE LOWERED AT 3 PM DST SOUTH OF CAPE MAY NEW JERSEY BUT REMAIN DISPLAYED FROM CAPE MAY NORTHWARD TO EASTPORT MAINE. SMALL CRAFT ALONG THE DELAWARE BAY AND COASTAL WATERS SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WIND AND SEA SUBSIDE. HURRICANE DONNA PASSED INSHORE OVER CENTRAL LONG ISLAND N. Y. AT 3 PM DST AND IS MOVING NNE AT 35-40 MPH. TOTAL RAINFALL IN WILMINGTON SINCE 4 PM DST SEPT 11 WAS 5.62 CAUSING LOCAL FLOODING IN LOW AREAS. HIGHEST SUSTAINED WINDS WERE FROM THE NORTH AT 37 MPH WITH GUSTS TO 51 MPH.

LOCAL STATEMENT NUMBER 8 ON HURRICANE DONNA FOR CONN AND THE SPRINGFIELD AREA IN MASS ISSUED BY THE HARTFORD CONN WEATHER BUREAU AT 430 PM EDT MON SEPT 12 1960

AT 4 PM HURRICANE DONNA WAS CENTERED ON THE CENTRAL CONN COAST MOVING NORTHWARD ABOUT 40 MPH. THIS PATH WILL BRING THE CENTER CLOSE TO HARTFORD BY ABOUT 5 PM.

ALL PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE CONTINUED FOR HURRICANE FORCE WINDS 75 MPH OR HIGHER AND TIDES RUNNING 10 FEET OR MORE ABOVE NORMAL CAUSING SEVERE TIDAL FLOODING ON THE CONN COAST UNTIL THE CENTER PASSES WELL OUT TO THE NORTH. INTERESTS IN SOUTHEASTERN CONN SHOULD REMAIN ALERT BUT NO DAMAGING FLOODS ARE EXPECTED ON LARGER STREAMS OR RIVERS. RAIN WILL TAPER OFF IN CONN AND THE SPRINGFIELD AREA DURING THE NEXT TWO OR THREE HOURS.

STATEMENT ON HURRICANE DONNA AND HEAVY RAINS OVER EASTERN NEW YORK ISSUED BY ALBANY WEATHER BUREAU 5 PM EDT SEPTEMBER 12 1960.

HURRICANE DONNA PASSED ACROSS CENTRAL LONG ISLAND MOVING NORTH NORTHEASTWARD ABOUT MIDAFTERNOON. ITS FUTURE PATH WILL TAKE THE STORM FARTHER AWAY FROM THE INTERIOR OF EASTERN N. Y. BY LATE TONIGHT. RAIN AND WINDS WILL DIMINISH EARLY THIS EVENING AND RAIN WILL END BY LATE TONIGHT. RAINFALL AMOUNTS OVER THE LOWER ADIRONDACKS SOUTHWARD THROUGH THE CATSKILLS AND ITS WESTERN FOOTHILLS AND EASTWARD INTO NEW ENGLAND HAVE RANGED BETWEEN THREE AND SIX INCHES. APPROXIMATELY ANOTHER INCH WILL OCCUR. THIS WILL PRODUCE FLOODING TONIGHT IN MANY SMALL STREAMS AND LOW PLACES AND ALL INTERESTS ALONG SMALL STREAMS SHOULD BE ALERT TO HIGH WATER IN THEIR AREA. LOCAL STATEMENT NUMBER 9 ON HURRICANE DONNA FOR CONN AND THE SPRINGFIELD AREA IN MASS ISSUED AT 6 PM EDT BY THE HARTFORD WEATHER BUREAU SEPT 12 1960

THE CENTER OF HURRICANE DONNA NOW BECOMING DIFFUSE IS PASSING NORTHWARD OUT OF CONN INTO CENTRAL MASS. RAIN WILL TAPER OFF AND END OVER CONN AND IN THE SPRINGFIELD AREA EARLY THIS EVE WITH WEST TO NORTHWEST WINDS 20 TO 30 MPH AND GUSTS TO 50 MPH DIMINISHING SLOWLY TONIGHT. LOCAL FLASH FLOODING WILL CONTINUE ON BROOKS AND STREAMS UNTIL THE RAIN ENDS BUT DAMAGING FLOODING IS NOT EXPECTED ON LARGER STREAMS OR RIVERS.

LOCAL STATEMENT NUMBER 3 ISSUED BY THE PROVIDENCE WEATHER BUREAU 730 PM EDT SEPTEMBER 12 1960

THE DANGER FROM HURRICANE DONNA IS NOW OVER FOR THE RHODE ISLAND AREA AND HURRICANE WARNINGS WILL BE LOWERED LATER THIS EVENING. HURRICANE DONNA HAS NOW MOVED NORTHEASTWARD BEYOND SOUTHERN NEW ENGLAND AND WEATHER CONDITIONS WILL GRADUALLY RETURN TO NORMAL DURING THE NIGHT.

DURING THE PEAK OF THE STORM A GUST OF 81 MPH WAS NOTED AT HILLSGROVE WITH THE HIGHEST SUSTAINED WIND 58 MPH. AT THE SAME TIME BLOCK ISLAND MEASURED A GUST OF 130 MPH. THE PRESSURE FELL TO A LOW OF 28.66 INCHES AT HILLSGROVE DURING THE STORM WHICH WAS THE LOWEST SEA LEVEL PRESSURE EVER RECORDED IN THE PROVIDENCE AREA WITH THE PASSAGE OF A HURRICANE. TOTAL RAINFALL FROM THE STORM WAS 2.22 INCHES .

STATEMENT ON HURRICANE DONNA BY BOSTON WEATHER BUREAU AT 7 45 PM EDT SEPT 12 1960

HURRICANE DONNA MOVED ACROSS THE SOUTHERN NEW ENGLAND COAST EARLY IN THE AFTERNOON WITH THE CENTER MOVING NORTH NORTHEASTWARD ACROSS EASTERN CONNECTICUT THROUGH CENTRAL MASSACHUSETTS. IT IS CURRENTLY LOCATED IN SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE.

HURRICANE WINDS WERE NOTED THROUGH RHODE ISLAND AND EASTERN MASSACHUSETTS DURING THE MIDDLE OF THE AFTERNOON.

BOSTONS STRONGEST WIND WAS 62 MPH WITH GUSTS TO 79 MPH RECORDED SHORTLY BEFORE 6 PM.

WINDS WILL GRADUALLY SUBSIDE BUT WILL REMAIN 30 TO 40 MPH DURING MOST OF THE NIGHT.

THE HEAVY RAIN IS OVER AND SKIES WILL BEGIN TO CLEAR AROUND MIDNIGHT. NO MAJOR FLOODING IS EXPECTED ON THE RIVERS IN THE BOSTON AREA. TIDES WHICH WERE 12 FT ABOVE MEAN LOW WATER AT 5 PM WILL SUBSIDE THROUGH THE NIGHT.
